Primary class size reduction in 2004-05

I am writing further to memorandum 2004: B5 - Education Funding for 2004-05 to provide additional information regarding primary class size reduction in 2004-05.

To improve learning for Ontario's youngest students, the government has made a commitment to implement a cap of 20 students in primary (JK - Grade 3) classes. This initiative is a key part of the government's plan to improve public education and ensure that students have a high level of literacy and numeracy before they reach age 12.

As a first step, the government is investing $\$ 90 \mathrm{M}$ in primary class size reduction in the 2004-05 school year. This memorandum provides further information about this initiative, including projected board-by-board allocations, and requirements for planning and implementation.

The purpose of this funding is to allow all school boards to achieve a measure of class size reduction in the primary grades in 2004-05. It does not fund, nor require school boards to achieve, a primary class size cap in 2004-05. Consultation with school boards and other education partners on the multi-year implementation of a cap will start in 2004-05, leading to full implementation by the 2007-08 school year.

## A. FUNDING APPROACH IN 2004-05

The $\$ 90 \mathrm{M}$ will be allocated to school boards on a per-primary-pupil basis through a transitional allocation, the Primary Class Size Reduction Amount.
This amount is calculated by multiplying the 2004-2005 day school Average Daily Enrolment of elementary school pupils of the board, counting only pupils enrolled in Junior Kindergarten, Kindergarten and grades 1 to 3, by \$166. Table 1 (attached) shows the projected allocations for all school boards in 2004-05.

## B. IMPLEMENTATION REQUIREMENTS FOR 2004-05

The purpose of the Primary Class Size Reduction Amount is to lower primary class sizes. Each board will select schools or classes from the following categories:

- Schools where primary class sizes are large;
- Schools where primary students' achievement levels show they need extra supports; or
- A combination of such schools or classes.

The Primary Class Size Reduction Amount may be used only for three purposes:

1. Hiring the additional teachers needed to achieve smaller primary classes.
2. Meeting start-up costs for learning materials and classroom supplies in the additional classrooms.
3. The Ministry encourages boards to maximize the class size reduction achieved in 2004-05 by directing their allocations, to the greatest extent possible, to schools where there is space for additional classes. Where existing space in school buildings does not allow for the creation of new classes, a portion of the Primary Class Size Reduction Amount may be used to purchase or lease temporary space.
In 2004-05, which is a transitional year, the allocation cannot be used for permanent spaces. It is recognized that implementation of the primary class size cap will generate needs for permanent spaces, and this will be addressed in consultation and planning for full implementation. School boards may use their Grants for School Renewal to undertake repairs and renovations required to accommodate classrooms required for this initiative.

The Primary Class Size Reduction Amount must be spent in 2004-05 for the purposes intended. Any unspent amount must be returned to the Ministry.

## C. SCHOOL BOARD PLANS

Each school board will be required to submit a plan, approved by the board, outlining how it will use the Primary Class Size Reduction Amount to lower primary class sizes.

School board plans for primary class size reduction in 2004-05 must:

1. Include information about the board's priorities regarding the categories of schools or classes selected;
2. Outline how the new funding will be allocated for teachers, learning materials and classroom supplies, and, if applicable, temporary accommodation; and
3. Identify the schools where class sizes will be reduced.

To assist school boards in preparing their reports, the Ministry has developed a Primary Class Size Reduction Plan form (see attached). The form is to be submitted at the same time as the board's 2004-05 Estimates.

Each school board is required to make its plan available to parents and the public through school councils and on the board's website.

The Ministry will flow Primary Class Size Reduction Amount funding to a board after the Ministry has received the board's plan and verified that it meets the requirements listed above.

It should be noted that these requirements give each school board and its community considerable flexibility in determining the best use of this funding. As school boards face different circumstances and there is a need for flexibility in this transitional year, there is no specific requirement concerning the impact of primary class size reduction on a board's reporting of average class size in the elementary panel. It is required, however, that this investment have a discernible effect on average elementary class size in 200405 and that boards accomplish this while ensuring that average class size in the other elementary grades (4 to 8) does not increase.

## D. FINAL REPORT

The Ministry recognizes that plans made before the start of the 2004-05 school year may need to be adjusted in September 2004 or later in light of differences between projected and actual enrolment or other factors that affect the organization of a board's schools.

School boards will be required to report about the implementation of their plans and the results achieved on the Primary Class Size Reduction Final Report form (see attached). This form is to be submitted together with the Elementary Average Class Size Report due on December 15, 2004.

The final report will include:

1. A rationale for any changes in the board's approach in identifying categories of schools or classes as priorities for the implementation of the Primary Class Size Reduction Amount.
2. Details of actual and committed expenditures on teachers, learning materials and classroom supplies, and, if applicable, temporary accommodation; and
3. The number of additional classes created at each of the selected schools.

As with the plan, each school board is required to make its final report available to parents and the public through school councils and on the board's website.

## E. TEACHER SUPPLY IN 2004-05

The Ministry has projected that for 2004-05 there are enough teachers on a provincewide basis to begin implementing a reduction in primary class size. One option to address any gap between the numbers of vacancies and new teachers would be to offer substitute teachers the opportunity to move into full-time teaching positions.

## F. CONSULTATION ON IMPLEMENTATION OF A PRIMARY CLASS SIZE CAP IN FUTURE YEARS

To develop recommendations about the full implementation of the 20:1 cap, the Ministry will establish a technical working group with representatives of school boards and other education partners. This working group will support consultation to be done through the Education Partnership Table and advice from the Literacy and Numeracy Secretariat, which will also be represented on the technical working group. Further details of this technical working group will be provided in the near future.

The Ministry and the Ministry of Training, Colleges and Universities will, in consultation with education partners, develop and recommend a strategy to ensure adequate teacher supply in subsequent years to fully implement the capping of primary class size.
